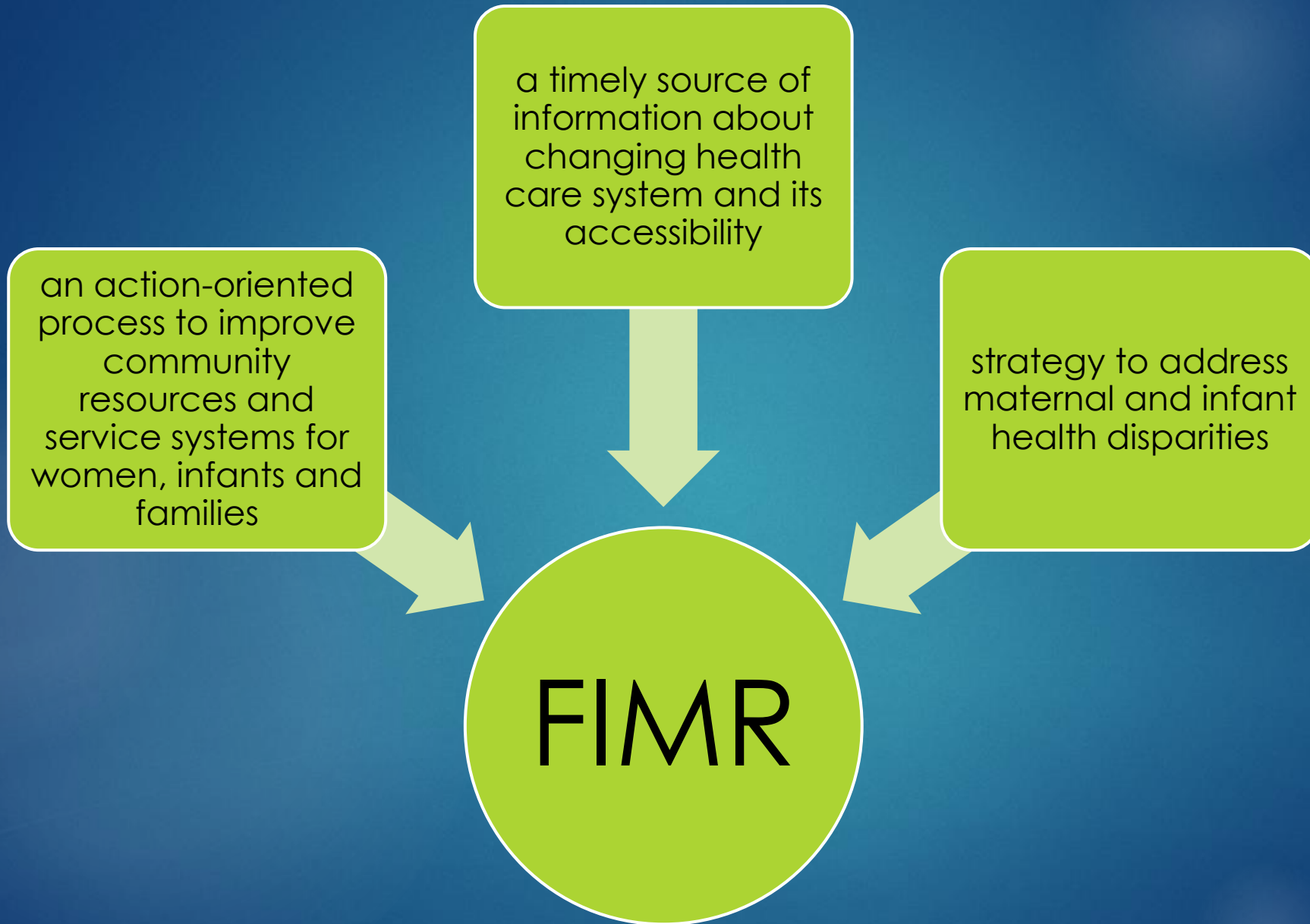

What is Infant Mortality Rate?

Infant mortality rates are **calculated** as the number of **deaths** in the first year of life divided by the number of live births, multiplied by 1000.

How does it compare?

IMR measurements	
Healthy People 2030 IMR Goal	5.0/1000 live births
National IMR	5.6/1000 live births (2019)*
Missouri IMR	6.1/1000 live births (2019)*
Kansas City, MO Black IMR	11.4/1000 live births (2017-2021)**
Kansas City, MO White IMR	4.13/1000 live births (2017-2021)**
Kansas City, MO all	6.9/1000 live births (2017-2021)**

Purpose of FIMR—To decrease infant mortality by:

Conduct

- Conduct a multidisciplinary review of fetal and infant deaths

Understand

- Understand how a wide array of local, social, economic, public health, educational, environmental and safety issues relate to infant loss

Use

- Use findings to take action to prevent other infant deaths

Improve

- Improve systems of care and resources for women, infants, and families

FIMR process

Death occurs

Data collection

Case review

Community action

Improved maternal and infant health



FIMR: A Two-Tiered System

Case Review Team

Reviews and Analyzes the data collected in interviews and medical record abstractions

Focuses on identifying correctable system factors and deficiencies in systems and resources to prevent similar cases

Summarizes findings and creates recommendations for the Community Action Team to implement



Community Action Team

Takes recommendations from the CRT and develops an action plan

Enhance the health and well-being of women, infants, and families in the community

Works with the community to implement interventions to improve resources and services systems available

About KCMO FIMR

- ▶ Started in 2003
- ▶ Institutional Review Board (IRB) approved annually through Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (MODHSS) and Bureau of Vital Statistics (BVS)
- ▶ Funded through the Federal Healthy Start Grant
- ▶ 10 ZIP codes in Jackson County which have the highest Infant Mortality Rates.
- ▶ Community Action Team housed at Nurture KC.

Success/accomplishments 2018-now continued

- ▶ KC Perinatal Bereavement Alliance
 - ▶ Group for perinatal bereavement staff from metro hospitals to come together to network, share resources, offer assistance, or troubleshoot issues.
 - ▶ Starting work on a debriefing toolkit for perinatal loss hospital staff.
- ▶ Stillborn Exam Checklist
- ▶ Prenatal Care Algorithm

Safe Sleep Certification Initiative

- ▶ Families and caregivers in Kansas City, Missouri practice safe sleep during nap time, bed time, every time.
- ▶ Top Cause of Death in Kansas City for infants
 - ▶ 2018-2020
 - ▶ Other top CODs
 - ▶ Prematurity
 - ▶ Birth Defects

Safe Sleep Certification Initiative

- ▶ Started about two years ago.
- ▶ Assisting metro hospitals obtain the Cribs for Kids Safe Sleep Certification
 - ▶ Providence Medical Center achieved Bronze certification March 2022
 - ▶ Liberty Hospital achieved Silver certification September 2022
 - ▶ University Health – Hospital Hill and Lakewood achieved Bronze certification August 2023
 - ▶ North Kansas City Hospital achieved Silver certification August 2023
 - ▶ 2 more hospitals projected to achieve certification by the end of 2023

Why?

Unsafe sleep circumstances account for 81% of nonmedical-related deaths

- Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID)
 - Suffocation
 - Entrapment
 - Infection
 - Ingestion
 - Metabolic diseases
 - Cardiac arrhythmias
 - Trauma
 - SIDS
- Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS)
- Accidental Suffocation and Strangulation in Bed (ASSB)
 - Suffocation by soft bedding
 - Overlay
 - Wedging or entrapment

In Missouri, Black babies die 2.75 times more often than White children.

- Remove barriers
- Culturally congruent messaging and education

Inpatient Setting

Policy and procedures

- AAP recommendations for safe sleep
- Skin-to-skin directions
- Identify infants ready for Home Sleep Environment (HSE)
- Involve social work when needed to provide support for families

Staff education

- Safe Sleep training
- Racial bias training

Parent/caregiver education

- Provide standardized education
 - Show videos
 - Provide printouts
 - Discuss barriers/concerns
